Prince Charles hails Houghton Revisited "a once in a lifetime experience"

One of the highlights of Russo-British cultural collaboration this year has been the "Houghton Revisited" exhibition at Houghton Hall, Norfolk. Then in 2010 a plan showing how the collection was displayed at Houghton was discovered in the archives of the Her-



mitage Museum in St Petersburg, and the idea to reassemble the paintings was born. Many of them had been sold by Stalin to raise funds for the Soviet state and had to be tracked down from as far afield as the National Gallery of Art in Washington DC and even Siberia.

As well as having the privilege of Prince Charles opening Houghton Revisited, the Oracle Capital Group Charitable Foundation, chaired by the Earl of Clanwilliam, attended a preview reception at the Russian Embassy in London, hosted by the Russian Ambassador, His Excellency Alexander Yakovenko and Mrs Nana Yakovenko.
